
Our annual Stewardship Dinner will be held on Sunday, October 17th. The location will be announced as the date draws near.

Installing Love

Tech Support: Yes, how can I help you?

Customer: Well, after much consideration, I've decided to install Love. Can you guide me through the process?

Tech Support: Yes. I can help you. Are you ready to proceed?

Customer: Well, I'm not very technical, but I think I'm ready. What do I do first? **Tech Support:** The first step is to open your Heart. Have you located your Heart?

Customer: Yes, but there are several other programs running now. Is it okay to install Love while they are running?

Tech Support: What programs are running?

Customer: Let's see, I have Past Hurt, Low Self-Esteem, Grudge and Resentment running right now.

Every two years we hold a confirmation/commission class for our 8th and 9th graders. This is a 14 week class that helps the students explore what it means to be a Christian and a Presbyterian. Through homework and class work the students are introduced to the tenets of our faith and the polity (government) of our denomination. At the end of the class each student is given the option of being confirmed if they feel ready. One of the main assignments is for the students to write a statement of faith. This statement is then read out loud at for the entire Session. The Session members can then examine the students as to their understanding of all that they learned.

HAMBURGER BARLEY VEGETABLE SOUP

- 1 1/2 lb ground beef
- 6 cups water
- 3 beef flavored bouillon cubes or 3 tsp instant bouillon
- 2 cups sliced carrots

2 medium coarsely chopped onions 1/3 cup barley
1 1/2 cups chopped celery 1 tsp salt
1/2 cup coarsely chopped green pepper 1/8 tsp pepper
2 bay leaves 1/4 cup catsup


28 oz. can tomatoes, undrained, cup up 8 oz. can tomato paste

In 5 qt. heavy pot, brown ground beef; drain. Stir in remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Reduce heat, cover and simmer one hour or until vegetables and barley are tender. Remove bay leaves. Makes 10 (1 1/2 cup) servings

Homemade Pan Rolls

- 3 to 3 1/2 cups Gold Medal® all-purpose flour
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 package regular or quick active dry yeast
- 1/2 cup very warm water (120°F to 130°F)
- 1/2 cup very warm milk (120°F to 130°F)
- 1 eac


Butter or margarine, melted

- 1. Mix 2 cups of the flour, the sugar, shortening, salt and yeast in medium bowl. Add warm water, warm milk and egg. Beat with electric mixer on low speed 1 minute, scraping bowl frequently. Beat on medium speed 1 minute, scraping bowl frequently. Stir in enough remaining flour to make dough easy to handle.
- 2. Turn dough onto lightly floured surface. Knead about 5 minutes or until smooth and elastic. Place in greased bowl and turn greased side up. Cover and let rise in warm place about 1 hour or until double. Dough is ready if indentation remains when touched
- 3. Grease bottoms and sides of 2 round pans, 9x1 1/2 inches.
- 4. Punch down dough. Cut dough in half; cut each half into 12 pieces. Shape into balls. Place close together in pans. Brush with butter. Cover and let rise in warm place about 30 minutes or until double.
- 5. Heat oven to 400 ℃.

It is remarkable to me the number of "new years" we experience throughout the year. There is, of course, January 1, but there are others. In the church the new year begins with Advent in December as we celebrate the beginning of Christ's life. In many government offices and businesses, there is a fiscal year which begins on July 1. For Jews there is a new year in September. For students and their families there is a new year that begins after Labor Day with the beginning of a new school year. For many churches, including ours, we begin a new year of Sunday school classes, renewed worship hours after summer vacations and a focus on fall activities.

Next month we will celebrate the annual harvest home dinner and we will have our annual fellowship dinner to kick-off our stewardship season.

This year we have a special theme, "Hope for the Future." As Hope Church we are invited by God to step into the future by envisioning what can happen if we return to God some of the material resources he has already given us. The Session has already been planning the budget for next year. Part of that process has led them to think about what new and exciting things might happen through the budget if people caught a vision of hope in their giving to this church. This song, however, can give us heart to risk ourselves and our gifts for "Hope for the Future" by stepping out in faith. Come hear these words sung at our Stewardship Dinner.
