<u>How to speak Presbyterian</u>

It has been estimated that 58 percent of the members of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) did not grow up in the denomination. For readers in that category, here is a short rundown of the lingo you are likely to hear in a Presbyterian church that you may not have heard in another church.

Lord's Supper

This is the meal we share from the Lord's Table. Some churches call this meal Communion or the Eucharist. Eucharist is from the Greek word for "thanksgiving," which is what Jesus did before he gave the bread and wine to his disciples

<u>Manse</u>

This is a house owned by a congregation that they let the minister live in. In some denominations this is called the "parsonage." The word *manse* comes from the Latin word *mansio* which means "dwelling."

Anyway, this day he was standing looking at some ants. I asked him what he was thinking. "I'm wondering if ants can hear. Do you know whether ants have ears?"



Know Your Elders: Al Manus

I was confirmed at Hope Presbyterian Church on May 13th, 1956, that was a long time ago.

Serving on a session has been a rewarding experience. During the two years on session I have served as co-chair of Missions. The mission committee working with other functions in the church and the extended community has accomplished much. These accomplishments can be attributed to a number of factors. First of all there is you – the individual members of the congregation. Nothing that we could have accomplished could have done without your support and encouragement and the session's. What struck me most in the stories told by my aunts were their love and compassion for the people they served and the strong bond within the missionary community. My aunts were indeed blessed. So I said why not, and I looked to missions.

The benefit dance on November 13th supporting next year's youth mission trip grossed approximately \$427 with 21 tickets sold comprising about 31 ticket holders. As a fund raiser the event was somewhat disappointing but we more than covered our costs. In terms of a church family event, the event was outstanding. The caller was an understanding instructor, the food donated was irresistible, and the room was filled with smiling faces. At the close of the evening there were a number of exhausted happy participants. A thank you goes to everyone who participated and/or contributed to this event. All your efforts were greatly appreciated.

Limited Progress Being Made in Addressing Make Shift Accommodations in Lakewood

On September 21,2010, Hope Presbyterian Church hosted a forum on homelessness – a focus on the issues and what is being done to address. Subsequent to that date limited progress has been made as reported at a H.E.L.P (Homelessness Ended through Local Partners) meeting on November 8th.. The Dover Woods Health Clinic will have 60 beds available to accommodate the homeless and is receiving tentative support from elected officials in Lakewood and Toms River.

An open house was tentatively scheduled for November 18th and Pastor Steve Brigham, Lakewood homeless community leader, agreed to bring persons from the Lakewood homeless community to the open house. The success of this breakthrough is not guaranteed, there is possible strong opposition from the local community. The direction our elected officials take is based on their assessment of attitudes within the community.

CHRISTMAS CAROLING is scheduled for December 12th. This is an all member church event. We would like to get names of folks to visit that night. 
