BOOK STUDY GROUP



Hope's Book Study Group has chosen its next two books that we will be reading for our spring meetings. On March 20th we will be discussing the book, Mornings In Jenin by Susan Abulhawa. This is the story of one family's struggle and survival through over sixty years of the Palestinian-Israeli conflict carrying us from Jenin to Jerusalem, to Lebanon and the anonymity of America. It is a story of faith, forgiveness and of life-sustaining love. Mornings In Jenin is haunting and heart wrenching, a novel of vital contemporary importance. Lending human voices to the headlines, it forces us to take a fresh look at one of the defining political conflicts of our life-times.

On May 15th we will discuss the book, <u>Little Bee</u> by Chris Cleave. This #1 New York Times Bestseller is the story of two women. Their lives collide one fateful day, and one of them has to make a terrible choice, the kind of choice we hope you never have to face. Two years later, they meet again—the story starts there...

How to speak Presbyterian

It has been estimated that 58 percent of the members of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) did not grow up in the denomination. For readers in that category, here is a short rundown of the lingo you are likely to hear in a Presbyterian church that you may not have heard in another church.

PRESBYTERY

The presbytery is made up of a group of churches usually in a certain geographical area.

The presbytery meeting includes "presbyters," both ruling and teaching elders, who gather to make decisions affecting the presbytery. By having their representatives gather together as a group congregations both support each other and are held accountable to each other.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR...



It's that time of year again when we move into the Lenten season. I have received many questions as to why Easter is so late this year. It falls on April 24th. In other years it has fallen in early March while in other years it has fallen somewhere in between.

Easter is considered a moveable feast which means that it does not occur on the same date every year. In 325 AD the Council of Nicaea set the date of Easter as the Sunday following the paschal full moon, which is the full moon that falls on or after the vernal (spring) equinox.

Easter always occurs on a Sunday because Sunday was the day of Christ's Resurrection. It occurs on the Sunday following the paschal full moon because that was the date of Passover in the Jewish calendar, and the Last Supper occurred on the Passover. Therefore, Easter is the Sunday after Passover.

Lent is the period of the liturgical calendar leading up to Easter. The traditional purpose of Lent is the preparation of the believer — through prayer, penitence, almsgiving and self-denial — for the annual commemoration during Holy Week of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus, which recalls the events linked to the Passion of Christ and culminates in Easter, the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Conventionally, it is described as being forty days long. The forty days represent the time that, according to the Bible, Jesus spent in the desert before the beginning of his public ministry, where he endured temptation.

During Lent folks sometimes "give up" something they like in order to enter into this time of self-sacrifice. As a child I remember giving up sweets for Lent which was very difficult for me to do. As I have gotten older, rather than "giving up" something, I try to "take something on," whether that is more intentional devotional time, or some kind of service project.

This year, I encourage each one of you to think of something you can "take on" during the next forty days—something that will help you get closer to God, or something that will help another person. I'm also going to challenge you to make a commitment to come to worship every Sunday during this season of Lent and Easter and see what a difference it can make in your life.

On Easter morning we will gather together to celebrate the good news of Jesus' resurrection—that news that gives all of us life, hope and purpose. I hope you will be able to be here in these weeks leading up to our celebration of the resurrection so that you will be able to enter into the joy of the day more fully.

The Window to Nowhere

A few months ago you may have noticed a window glass hanging in the Narthex of the church. It is rather large and is blue and amber with a dirty white frame. If you haven't seen it, look up and to your right the next time you enter.

The window pane is from the old church building on the west side of Hope Chapel Road. It was removed by some of the 2010 Buildings & Grounds Committee members. Session had Ok'd it to be brought over and hung in our current facility. Eventually it will be set in a frame and backlit so it stands out more. It may even be moved again. We will have to wait and see.

It was brought over as a piece of the history of Hope. In speaking with Laura Johnson, she stated that she does not recall it every being changed, thus it is quite possible it is the real thing. Not to make Laura feel old but she said the window is at least 80 with a smile on her face. So to the best of our knowledge, or those that have been here longer, it is the original rear window from the old church sanctuary. That in itself dates it back to between 1879 and 1888.

For those of you that can remember being in the old building, you looked at that window every time you were in a pew. For those of us who happened to be there in the late afternoon on a sunny day, the reflections from the colored glass lit, and danced across, the inside walls of the sanctuary. And that was after the two rear rooms had been added on. You see when that was done, the people that constructed the addition made sure that there was a new rear window in the attic. That is what allowed the light to funnel through to continue to shine through the colored glass. It really was a magnificent sight the first time you saw the glimmer of the blue and amber mixing on the opposite wall. In more recent times it also helped that Tom Hayes had installed a flood lamp behind it so it would show up more.

So for those of you who didn't know, I hope this helps a little. For those of you who did know I hope it brings back some memories of the old days at Hope.


