# Pastor Paul's Page

## **How Often Do We Want to Remember Jesus?**

The Lord Jesus, on the night before he was crucified, gave his disciples one, particular, specific way to remember him. He took some of the bread left over from the Passover meal. He blessed it, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body. Do this in remembrance of me." Then he took one of the cups of wine also left over from the meal. He blessed it and shared it with them as well, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this in remembrance of me."

Jesus did a lot of things. We who follow him try to remember them all. We try to remember and keep all his teachings. We want to remember Jesus all the time. But there is only one thing that he did which he himself identified as *the* way to remember him. And that is the sharing of bread and cup which we call by many names including the Eucharist, the Divine Liturgy, Holy Communion, and the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

In this Sacrament, we find summed up the various ways in which Jesus is "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world."

We are reminded of the bread and wine brought to Abraham by the priest-king Melchizedek, who prefigures Christ (Genesis 14:18; Psalm 110:4; Hebrews 5, 6, 7).

We are reminded most obviously of Passover, and the lamb whose blood saved the people from death (Exodus 12).

We are reminded of how God fed the people in the wilderness with the "bread" of manna (Exodus 16:4).

We are also reminded of how Jesus fulfills the Day of Atonement ritual in which sacrificial blood is used to purify the Temple and reestablish the relationship of the people with God, and a goat bears the people's sin away (Leviticus 16).

We are reminded of the way the Suffering Servant also bears the sin of others (Isaiah 53).

We are reminded of the bread that was offered to God daily in the tabernacle and temple (Exodus 25:30; Leviticus 8:26, etc.).

We are reminded of how Jesus feeds the people, multiplying the loaves on the hillside (Mark 6:30-44//; John 6).

We are reminded of all the meals Jesus celebrates with people, especially the way he is known after his resurrection by his disciples who see him blessing and breaking bread (Luke 24:13-35).

In other words, the whole story of God's saving activity with people is reflected and expressed in this Sacrament.

Therefore, the early church, wanting to remember him frequently and regularly, celebrated this simple meal at least every Lord's Day when gathering for worship. (Some Christians developed the discipline of celebrating the Sacrament as often as *daily*.)

In the corruption of the Medieval Roman church, the people got out of the habit of participating in the Sacrament regularly. A Christian only had to take communion once-a-year as a bare minimum; and the people were excluded from receiving the cup. It became a mysterious thing priests did and people watched.

The Protestant Reformers reinstituted the Sacrament at the center of church life. John Calvin in particular advocated celebrating it at least every Lord's Day, as in the early church. In response to this Reformation critique, the Roman Catholic church then reformed its own practice to encourage more frequent communion. Unfortunately, in some branches of Protestantism the baggage from the corrupt Medieval church was too weighty, and they failed to institute weekly celebration of the Sacrament. By the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, some Christian churches had degenerated to the point where they were remembering Jesus according to the way he wanted and instructed his followers to remember him only two or four times a year.

What? What was their problem? Were they somehow getting *enough* of Jesus? Were they worried they might get *too much* of Jesus? Did they just have better memories than most humans, and only needed to remember Jesus occasionally? Did they only dole out Jesus in infrequent bits to artificially make the Sacrament seem more important and meaningful? Hello? When did Jesus say, "Remember me, but not too often"? When did receiving the body and blood of the Lord become something people imagined could lose meaning for them if they did it too much? The meaning comes from Jesus Christ, by his word and command. If individual Christians, with their brief attention spans, were bored by this, that was certainly not the fault of the Sacrament instituted by the Lord; it was that of his wayward people.

By far the *worst* reason for infrequently celebrating the Sacrament is religious bigotry. It's "too Catholic," I have been told. Which is ironic, since the Reformers wanted communion *more often* than the practice in the Roman church. Anyway, does this mean we're not supposed to follow Jesus' explicit instructions just because some other Christians *do*? Seriously?

In the second half of the 20<sup>th</sup> century some of these churches, including the Presbyterians, finally began to change, not without resistance. My dad's generation of pastors was responsible for getting us to where it is now the norm to celebrate the Sacrament monthly (even though there is no New Testament warrant for doing much of anything according to a monthly calendar.)

But monthly communion was always a stop-gap, provisional, temporary, transitional measure intended to lead eventually to the weekly celebration practiced in the early church and advocated by the Reformers. Well, okay, it's been 50 years already. Maybe it's time for phase two?

In this the burden of proof is squarely upon those who want to keep communion restricted to monthly. If there are any coherent biblical and theological reasons for this, I haven't heard them.

Look: Jesus gives us a specific way to remember him. The question is really not how often we want to celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. It is: How often do we want to remember Jesus?

DISTASTER RELIEF We will continue our efforts in the New Year to contribute to the Hurricane Kits. The Mission Committee will also be learning more from PDA Presbyterian Disaster Assistance about details for Mission Trips in the summer of 2018 and beyond.

With all of the disasters that are occurring around the country we are collecting supplies t help the victims get back on their feet. There are three different kits that are needed. A Clean Up Bucket, Hygiene Kit or a School Kit. Donations can be for everything that is needed in one kit or just a few items for a kit. # **GIFT OF HEART KITS**

### Disaster relief

## CLEAN UP BUCKET

(Value \$75.00)

1 five gallon bucket

5 scouring pads

7 sponges, assorted sizes

1 scrub brush

1 pkg. cleaning towels (18 reusable, like Easy Wipes)

1 50oz. or two 25oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent

1 liquid concentrated household cleaner (like Lysol), 12oz

1 bottle liquid disinfectant dish soap (like Dawn), 24-28oz.

1 1 pkg. clothespins, 48-50

1 clothesline, two 50ft or one 100ft.

5 dust masks

2 pairs latex gloves (like Playtex)

1 pair work gloves

1 roll of 24 to 28 count heavy duty trash bags (30-45 gallon, remove from carton)

1 bottle insect repellant (pump, drops or lotion; not aerosol) 6-9 oz

Please purchase all liquids in plas-

bottles. Send on new, unopened materials. Put all items in the plastic bucket, packed securely to avoid damage during shipment, and seal lid with packing tape.

\*Some local fast-food restaurants are willing to give pickle buckets (or other 5 gallon buckets will resealable lids) or offer them for a small fee. These can be washed out and used for the cleanup buckets.

### HYGIENE KIT

(Value \$15.00)

1 hand towel (approximately 16"x28", no fingertip or bath towel)

1 wash cloth

1 wide tooth comb (remove from package)

1 nail clipper (UPDATE: nail clippers with metal files or emery boards attached are now accepted; remove from package)

1 bar of soap (bath size in wrapped)

1 toothbrush (in original packaging)

10 Band-Aids or other adhesive bandage strips

Please do no add toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit. Toothpaste which has an extended expiration date will be added to international Hygiene Kit shipment. Seal all items in the one-gallon plastic bag with a zipper closure.

# SCHOOL KIT

(Value \$15.00)

1 pair of blunt scissors (rounded tip)

3 70 count spiral notebooks or tapebound pads of 8"x10 1/2" ruled paper or pads with 200-210 sheets of ruled paper. Do not include filler paper.

1 30 centimeter ruler (12")

1 hand held pencil sharpener

6 new pencils with erasers

1 large eraser

1 box or 24 crayons

1 cloth bag, 12"x14" to 14"x17" finished size cotton cloth bag with cloth handles; see pattern below. (Please do not use reusable shopping bags or backpacks.)
Pack all items in the cloth bags.

## SCHOOL KIT

(Continued)

### **School Bag Pattern**

#### Material needed:

1/2 yd "Kid Friendly" Fabric

#### Make the Bag:

Cut two pieces of fabric 13"x17" Place the two pieces together, right sides together, and sew a 1/2" seam down one side, across the bottom, and up the other side, leaving the top open.

Turn the bag so the seam is in the inside.

Turn under 1/2" on the top edges and press.

Turn under 2" at the top edge to form a hem and stitch.

#### Make the Handles:

Cut two pieces of fabric 4"x 22" Fold in half one of the 4"x 22" pieces with right sides together. Stitch with a 1/2" seam allowance and turn inside out, **or** turn under and press 1/2" on long side of fabric. Fold wrong sides together. Top stitch close to edge. Press. Repeat for the second handle. Press Turn under raw edges and stitch to the top of the bag.

Finished bag will be approximately 12"x14". Place items in bag

Canvas tote bags can also be used. Inexpensive canvas bags are available at area craft and discount stores. Tote bags can also be purchased online at www.myshopangel.com
